Governor Youngkin's Proposed 2024-2026 Budget (<u>HB30/SB30</u>) <u>Preliminary</u> Summary of Higher Education Budget Outlook

University of Virginia

- <u>Institute of Biotechnology</u> up to \$55M in one-time funding for the Institute of Biotechnology, provided as part of \$100M total investment to launch "Virginia's Research Triangle."
 - Designed to foster collaboration among UVA, Virginia Tech, and VCU in biotechnology, life sciences, and pharmaceutical manufacturing.
 - Virginia Tech's Fralin Biomedical Research Institute will receive up to \$30M, and VCU's Medicine for All Institute will receive up to \$15M.
 - The Virginia Innovation Partnership Authority will coordinate the efforts, commercialization, and startup support.
 - Establishes a Network Advisory Board that will include the presidents of each participating university and requires a new MOU between the Board and institutions to coordinate efforts.
 - Removes the \$7.5M annual equipment trust fund (ETF) allocation included in the 2022-24 biennium for the Institute of Biotechnology.
- \$2M in one-time funding in FY2025 for *campus security and safety initiatives*, to be coordinated with the Virginia Fusion Center.
- \$12M in FY2025 to address <u>deferred maintenance</u> needs for educational and general (E&G) buildings. This is a separate capital appropriation from the normal maintenance reserve appropriation.

UVA's College at Wise

- \$150,000 in one-time funding in FY2025 for *campus security and safety initiatives*, to be coordinated with the Virginia Fusion Center.
- Continues *indirect cost recovery relief* for the 2024-26 biennium.
- \$1.5M in FY2025 to address *deferred maintenance* needs for E&G buildings.
- Authorizes planning for the renovation of Darden Hall.

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Preliminary Summary of 2024-26 Higher Education Budget Outlook

General Higher Education

- Requires <u>Level III institutions to provide 25% institutional support for new construction, major renovation, or acquisition of E&G projects authorized in FY2025 or later</u> (does not apply to maintenance, safety, security, or infrastructure, and UVA Wise projects).
- Continues \$75M each year to maintain the *affordable access program*.
 - o UVA's allocation is \$4M, and UVA Wise's allocation is \$501,000 in FY25.
 - Directs the Sec. of Education and SCHEV to establish performance standards for each institution based on the most recent six-year plan and requires each institution to submit a performance plan.
 - o Requires institutions to update the performance plan in FY2026 and to limit in-state undergraduate tuition increase to the lesser of 2.5% or CPI-U.
 - Authorizes the Sec. of Education to determine FY2026 allocations at not less than 50% of the FY25 allocation.
- Continues \$37.5M in FY2025 one-time funding to continue efforts to attract and retain *Pell-eligible students*. This amount is eliminated in FY2026.
- Additional \$2M in each year for *innovative internship program* (total annual allocation: \$22M).
- \$30M additional funds in each year to support establishing additional *lab schools*.
- \$2M each year to maintain the *Virginia Military Survivors and Dependents Education Program (VMSDEP) stipend*. This represents the total for all institutions of higher education and allocations would be determined by SCHEV.
- \$3M each year to support <u>mental health services</u> at institutions of higher education. SCHEV will pursue a statewide contract for student mental health services, which may include a virtual care option.
- Provides additional \$21M in FY2025 and \$16M in FY2026 to support the *Eastern Virginia Health Sciences Center*.

Employee Compensation

- One percent <u>base salary increase</u> for full-time state employees, including faculty, University staff, and graduate TAs, effective June 10, 2025 (may be merit-based).
- One-time <u>1% bonus</u> for full-time state employees, including faculty and University staff, effective December 1, 2024, and December 1, 2025.

Health-Related

- Additional funding for *nursing initiatives*:
 - o \$4M in each year for Earn to Learn
 - o \$936K in each year for Nursing Scholarships and Loan Repayment Program
- Significant increases in *mental health support services* (outlined <u>here</u>):
 - \$23M to expand school-based mental health services for children, including expanding telehealth services.
 - \$46M to address emergency room alternatives, including crisis receiving centers and stabilization units, and publicly funded mobile crisis response teams.
 - \$10M for hospital partnerships to build specialized emergency rooms for psychiatric patients.
 - \$58M for behavioral health workforce, including salary increases for state hospitals, behavioral health loan repayment, and more clinical training and residency sites.
 - \$28M in opioid abatement and response initiatives, including wastewater monitoring, naloxone availability, and services for substance use disorders.

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
